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It has been said that "timing is everything". If that is true, there is no better time of year than the Fall to reflect on our accomplishments.

During our travels between our Laconia and Plymouth offices, we cannot help but be in awe of the wonder of the New Hampshire foliage, and its reflection on the bodies of water here in the Greater Lakes Region. Those reflections give us twice the viewing pleasure, yet we are unable to see the strength of the roots that are just underneath the surface.

Mental health is about the strength of things beneath the surface- hidden supports. Our roots here at Lakes Region Mental Health Center are what make us strong and responsive to change. Our strong roots help us to give support to those we treat, and to those in our community that we need to educate.

Like those hidden roots, mental illness is also often hidden from sight. We see a smile on a person's face, and think they are happy. You have to look beneath the surface to find that out- and that is what our professionals here at LRMHC do every day.

Do you remember some of the great ice storms we've experienced? The trees bent under the weight of the ice, but their roots kept them firmly fixed to the ground. In a similar way, our deep roots here at LRMHC keep our organization resilient and adaptable to change. In response to a nationwide mental health crisis, workforce challenges, and the specific needs of those in the communities we serve, we are in the process of creating a new strategic plan to guide us for the next three years. In an effort to continue our growth and support the community members who need us, this plan will strengthen our organization and ensure we are planting the seeds for new roots to take hold.

Lakes Region Mental Health fulfilled its purpose through the actions and dedication of our staff:

Our **Community Support Program** diagnosis team supported more than 150 patients, meeting the needs of those with co-occurring substance use and mental illness.


